We made a template that students can use that matches the new direction the Canada-Wide science fair is heading (changing problem, hypothesis, variables, etc... into Why? How? What? So What? What's Next?). Note that problem/hypothesis etc... still fit in those new categories, but the new categories also fit kids who make an innovation."

Physical Literacy Handout from Mrs. Polegato

This handout will go home next week. Here's what she says about it: "It covers simple ways that parents can assess a child's physical literacy. If you're wondering "At what age should my child be able to do these skills?" The short answer is that by the time children finish grade 3, they should have these basic physical literacy skills and then it's a matter of regularly engaging in a variety of physical activities to become more proficient - just like with numeracy and literacy."
